Expected Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course students will

- ➤ Have an understanding of the ways in which differences in languages, perceptions, behaviors, social norms and traditions influence how people from different cultures interact
- ➤ Be able to analyze and discuss various social and business situations to identify and address the consequences of linguistic and cultural differences
- ➤ Be able to identify and understand the need for multicultural education in a multicultural society
- ➤ Have a better understanding of the roles of language and ethnicity in a multicultural society

PROCEDURE: The objectives will be achieved through systematic analysis of the 74 cross-cultural dialogues in *Cross-Cultural Dialogues*, and each chapter in *Figuring Foreigners Out*, complemented by in-class discussions in which additional assigned readings in *Intercultural Communication* will be interpreted. Accordingly, the course is conceived as a 'hands on', participatory learning experience. Throughout the course attention will be called to key concepts in cross-cultural understanding. The course will be additionally enriched through the showing of a number of pertinent videos. Periodic quizzes and in-class review of the cross-cultural dynamics showcased in the dialogues and chapter discussions will measure students' grasp of the material.

HOMEWORK:

Reading assignments in *Cross-Cultural Dialogues* and, *Figuring Foreigners Out*, and one in-class Powerpoint presentation on a topic drawn from *Intercultural Communication*, which highlights the dynamics of cross-cultural interaction in a specific setting.

Calculating your final grade:

- Keep track of your four quiz grades, the lowest of which will be dropped. Add together the 3 remaining quiz grades. Divide this number by 3, then multiply by 0.40. This is the quiz-based component of your grade.
- ➤ Keep track of your absences, if any. Multiply the Numeric Score corresponding to the number of absences (see below) by 0.30. This is the attendance-based component of your grade.
- ➤ Multiply your in-class presentation score by 0.30
- ➤ Add together the results obtained in the three steps above to get your final grade.
