This year is flying by. Our Spring Break will be here before we know it (March 23-27). When we return from break, we will immediately begin our annual testing program with students in grades 3-6. The exact schedule will be sent home at a later date.

Does this sound like a familiar Dr. Seuss book: "And to Think That I Saw It On Mulberry Street?" I cannot believe we are heading into March! Before you know it, we will be in the last nine weeks of the year. We have been very fortunate to have an intern from Japan, Mr. Shimizu, doing his student teaching with us since January. It has been a very educational experience for all of us as we have tried to learn more about each other's cultures and celebrate both the similarities and differences. He has been doing a unit on his country since the last week in February. Mr. Shimizu will be going to a 5th grade class at Brooks following this placement and then heading back to Japan after graduation in May. We are going to miss him, but with the help of technology. we can still keep in touch!

I am very proud to say that 100 percent of the first-graders benchmarked on their latest DIBELS test. This is a testament to their focused attention and love for reading. We are also in the middle of a reading competition between three groups: the Mighty Lions, the UNA Lions, and the Ghost Readers. Although each child only has to earn 20 points by the end of the nine weeks, most of the students have already far exceeded that amount. They are truly team players, and get fired up if their team is behind in points. So far, it's a close race, so it will

be interesting to see which team wins the competition. Stay tuned for the results!

Our math and science curriculums involve many investigative activities. Most days, the children are involved in a variety of math stations and science explorations which allow for individual as well as group learning. In math, we are focusing in on time, money, addition, and subtraction. In science, we are exploring balance and motion. Our culminating activity is to design a roller coaster that allows the passengers (marbles) to stay on the roller coaster through many twists, turns, and heights. It is very exciting in the afternoon as we attempt to design the safest but most fun roller coasters!

February was a time to celebrate black history and presidents. Our first-graders are working on a project at home related to one of these topics. The projects are posted in the hall, so please take time to enjoy their hard work and efforts.

The week of March 2nd begins "Read Across America" in honor of Dr. Seuss. We will be doing a variety of activities related to different themes to celebrate reading. Look for these fun activities to be announced on the weekly calendar.

As you can see, we are extremely busy, and I am truly amazed at all these children are doing. And to think - they are only in the first-grade!

Second-grade News

The second-grade class has been learning so much. In math, they are learning to subtract two- and three-digit numbers with borrowing from the tens place.

In science, we have been learning about weight and balance using our equal-arm balances. Miss Black is teaching them about different careers in social studies. If you would like to come and share your career with them, that would be great! Sara Holcome's aunt came and talked about dental health.

She did a fantastic job and brought a nice dental

care bag for all of them. Mrs. Khan came and spoke about Pakistan, and what a wonderful experience that was.

Mr. Infanger is still coming every Tuesday and doing an outstanding job teaching Spanish. I want to thank all of these people, as well as all who help out in computer lab and helped with the Valentine's party. It was terrific!

Miss Black will be solo teaching until March 4th. She is working very hard and doing a great job. We will all miss her when she leaves.

Third-grade News

The third-grade has been busy since Christmas learning their multiplication facts and getting ready for their first SAT and ARMT tests. We have been working on many skills in class and have begun to practice for our tests using ARMT practice, Web Achiever, and COACH, which is a math and reading practice for the SAT. We want to be ready to do our very best!

We have had a lot of fun doing a data and probability unit with Mrs. Lawler, Mrs. Christopher, and Mrs. Warren. We have done many activities in the computer lab using data. We collected data from all the Kilby students on their favorite lunches, made spread sheets, and then made graphs on the computer. In the classroom, we made line graphs comparing the low temperatures of Florence with New York City. Our graphs are being displayed in the hall for everyone to see!

In science we recently began a unit on the human body. We jumped rope to see what parts of the body move when we are active. We counted our bones and have learned what bones do for the body. Next, we dissected owl pellets, and were amazed at what we found. We matched the rodent bones to its skeleton. Now we are ready to begin the joint tasks and discover the ways our joints help us move.

In social studies we have been learning about map and globe skills. We used the globe to learn continents, oceans, hemispheres, and latitude and longitude. We have done activities on kinds of maps, reading map keys, using the compass rose and map scales. We will also create a town for our walk on grid map and practice using coordinates. Our study will conclude with completing a map of Alabama by locating its major cities, rivers and regions.



Fourth-grade News

Students in fourth-grade have been actively participating in various academic competitions. Class members submitted entries to the 2008 Alabama History Timeline Bookmark Contest at the beginning of the school year. This was a statewide contest sponsored by the Alabama Department of Archives and History. We've learned that Gracie Crowley received Honorable Mention for her design. Congratulations, Gracie!

Our classroom Spelling Bee was held before Winter Break. We had 17 students participate. Fifth-grade Happenings

Kilby fifth-graders have been learning about a variety of interesting subjects.

In science, we have studied about the spheres of the Earth. In connection with the geosphere, the class made "Rock Cycle" fudge - a very tasty lesson! Along with our study of the solar system, we constructed a scale model which shows the vastness of just one system in the universe.

In math, we have been working on all things fractions, with a smattering of geometry and expanded notation (exponents) thrown in.

Reading lessons have included work on word count per minute (in relation to fluency) and comprehension skills for understanding.

For language, Kilby fifth-graders have been diligently preparing for the Alabama Direct Assessment of Writing (ADAW), a statewide essay writing test given each year near the end of February. Our students have been learning how to write essays in three

different modes: expository, descriptive, and narrative. We are working on narrative essays, and the students have been sharing some very interesting, funny, and/or scary stories with the class.

On Feb. 5th, our class finally traveled to Montevallo to the American Village. (The trip had been planned for mid-December but was postponed due to icy weather conditions.) At the American Village, fifth-graders from Kilby and several other schools participated in six vignettes (with actors in costume) portraying different events that occurred in American history from the Virginia Convention in 1775 to the inauguration of George Washington as the first president in 1793. The settings for the events were housed in scaled replicas of the original eighteenth century buildings. Although it was a very cold day, 23 students, nine parent chaperones, and Mrs. Berry all enjoyed a very entertaining and educational trip!

Sixth-grade News

January and February have been busy months! All of us were very proud of the ten sixth-graders who participated in the Kilby Geography Bee.

Also, we would like to congratulate Tucker Sigle for winning second place in the Kilby Spelling Bee. Tucker, along with Allie Vance, traveled to the county competition earlier this month.

Social Studies was highlighted this month with a presentation from General Noles of Florence. Gen. James Noles served in the Vietnam War. He spoke to students of how his assigned area, the Mekong Delta, had terrible living conditions, such as extreme temperatures, lots of mosquitoes, and waist-high muddy areas that were used as sleeping quarters. The sixth-graders appreciated his accounts of the war and

of his personal stories.

In addition to using the basal textbook in reading, students have been listening to the trade book, "Island of the Blue Dolphins" by Scott O'Dell in one of their rotating stations. In this book, students have learned a lot about survival, but also about natural beauty and personal discovery through the eyes of the book's main character, Karana.

The sixth-grade class would like to personally thank everyone who participated in our annual movie night (both of them)! Proceeds from the movies helped to reduce the amount each child had to pay for our end of the year field trip to Georgia.

Get ready to read!


