Maschal's Message

I cannot believe it is the end of another school year. I think this one has been a great one. We have had our kindergarten orientation, and that class is filled. The 6th graders are ready to go to the middle school. Congratulations! You made it, and we are proud of you!

Let's keep our reading scores high by reading this summer. If children stop reading for the next two months, they will fall behind. So set a goal today to have your child read at least 15-20 minutes a day. Start this the day after school ends.

In March, a visiting committee came to review our school. They interviewed teachers and parents about our school, and the report was beyond our expectations. We received the highest possible score in each category. This is due to the work of teachers, parents, and students. The faculty and the advisory committee will be reviewing these suggestions and deciding where to begin. We will need to work on these areas over the next five-year period to continue our accreditation with AdvancEd. Here are the committee's suggestions:

Recommendations

- Develop a clear, precise, and exact chart or information sheet to show relationships that exist between Kilby and Lauderdale and UNA.
- Incorporate, into the school technology plan, the use of System Technology Information (STI) Office, Classroom and Home modules.

Opportunities for Growth

 Focus on developing instruction to incorporate higher level thinking skills and develop problem solvers.

- Implement a writing program to equip students with the necessary tools to be proficient writers and perform to their highest potential on the ADAW. (Alabama Writing Test)
- Explore ways to validate the suggestions and input from the KKAB (Kilby Kids Advisory Board) and PTO by facilitating a joint planning session with the cafeteria personnel to better meet the needs of both entities.
- Develop a plan to obtain and implement Math software for student pacing, motivation, and data gathering of diagnostics.
- Implement a plan to incorporate data-driven programs that would provide higher order thinking for all students, especially the gifted, into the curriculum.
- Review the curriculum for gifted program to ensure that these students are afforded challenges to keep them self-motivated.
- Explore the need to accommodate special dietary needs of students in the school lunch program.
- Incorporate a public relations liaison in conjunction with the PTO Board to promote and encourage a positive image of the school in the surrounding communities.
- Explore the possibility of responding to more stakeholders, including representatives of Lauderdale County Public Schools, with a newsletter or email that shares school happenings, current events, and pertinent information.
- Incorporate time into teacher's schedules for corporate and cross grade level planning.

If you have any suggestions for where we should begin, please let me know. I hope that everyone has a safe and happy summer.


Second-grade News

Third-grade News

The last few months of school have been a busy time for the third grade. Not only did we look forward to special events such as the talent show, art and PE show, fun day and the AR reward, we are participating in several units in class.

Mrs. Christopher and Mrs. Warren are conducting a unit on historical sites in Alabama. We go online to visit sites such as the USS Alabama Battleship, Dauphin Island Sea Lab, Old Cahaba, and the Talledaga Speedway. We list facts and draw a picture for each site we visit.

These will be compiled into a booklet that will remind us of all we have learned. We went on field trips to several of the sites to visit them first hand, including Constitution Hall Village, where the constitution for the state of Alabama was written in 1819.

We are completing our last science unit on plant growth and development. We planted our brassica seeds after spring break and watched them germinate in just a few days. We observed, measured, and recorded information in our science notebooks. We used bee sticks to pollinate the flowers and watched as the seed pods began to grow.

Our intern, Miss Bratcher, is teaching a unit on pioneers. We have enjoyed researching Daniel Boone and learning about the travels of Laura Ingalls Wilder. We attended the Folk Life Festival at Constitution Hall Village where we saw candle making, spinning, the blacksmith making nails and many other demonstrations. We walked on stilts, spun hoops, danced the Virginia Reel and played with handmade wooden toys. We also participated in craft activities such as quilting, stitching and making cornhusk dolls. Our day culminated with a picnic at the park. It was a wonderful learning experience!

Our class has been competing with the first grade to see which class can get the most AR points. The first grade is ahead, but we are not giving up! Some of us have already reached our goal, and we are still reading. Go, third grade! Go!

Fifth-grade News

Fifth graders have just finished an exciting unit on the Civil War led by our intern, Miss Holley Banks. Several interesting activities were a part of the unit. For an introductory activity, students were given a list of six battles to research. Then, working in teams of two, they used the information and an online computer program to rate the importance of each battle to the outcome of the war. Reasons had to be given for the rank of each battle. It was interesting to see how similar the battle rankings were.

For another activity, each student drew the name of a noted Civil War personality. Girls drew women, and boys drew men. Each student then researched his/her "person" for certain biographical facts. After memorizing the facts, each student dressed like her/his character and was interviewed for a fictitious TV program about famous Civil War characters. The interviews were videoed, and a DVD copy was given to each student.

The major activity of the unit was a field trip to the Shiloh National Military Park, near Savannah, Tenn. A tour of the park was led by Mr. Chuck Shull and Mr. Michael Fennell. The class, Miss Holley, Mrs. Berry, and a large group of parents were shown important areas of the battlefield. Quotes from participants in the battles were read, and weapons and ammunition used in the fight were described. Many interesting stories about the soldiers and the battle were shared with the group. It was a very informative and enjoyable experience. The day after the trip, students wrote diamantes to express their reflections about the meaning of the battle.





Stanford Achievement Test week is over! I would like to thank all of my 23 sixth graders who diligently worked through the 10 subtests required. I really believe that everyone gave his or her best test performance. The sixth-grade group would also like to thank the cafeteria ladies for all of the wonderful snacks that were provided during testing. They were wonderful!

All of us were very proud of the 10 sixth graders who participated in the Kilby Geography Bee. Congratulations to Spencer White, who placed first, and to Melanie Hodges, who placed second. The Bee was very challenging but also a lot of fun.

Our class has enjoyed many language arts clinicals throughout the past weeks. Dr. Janice Myhan's students have been doing an excellent job teaching and reviewing out sixth graders on three of the four writing modes: descriptive,

expository, and narrative. Additionally, sixth graders have been introduced to many historical facts about the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island. Dr. Myhan's students have been very well prepared in teaching us about these topics.

Our AR reading has paid off. During the 2008-2009 school year, the sixth grade class has reached well over 7,000 points total! WOW! That's a lot of books! Isn't reading awesome! ©

Recently, we enjoyed a trip to Atlanta, Ga. The sixth-grade class visited the Georgia Aquarium (which featured the Titanic exhibit), CNN's inside-studio tour, dined at the Hard Rock Café for dinner, and participated in math day at Six Flags Amusement Park to top it off! Reading News

This has been a busy year! I can't believe it's quickly coming to an end. The implementation of our new reading series has gone very well. We have learned so much (both teachers and students), and I think that next year will be even better. Thanks to all our teachers for their hard work and diligence! They are the ones who made this time of transition go so smoothly.

We did our last DIBELS (Dynamic Indicators of Early Literacy Skills) May 4-8 for children in Kindergarten through third grade. I am eager to see how much our students have grown in their reading skills this year. When we first began DIBELS testing several years ago, 68% of our students in K-3rd were at the benchmark score on the test in August. We ended the year with 80% of our students at benchmark. Last May, 96% of our students benchmarked the test. I have high hopes this year and I expect to see an even higher percentage reach the benchmark score! All the things we

have learned throughout our ARI training, and the willingness of our faculty to implement them has really made a huge difference.

I also want to thank all the parents for your continued support at home. I know that your children get many opportunities to read at school, but it's all those extra minutes of reading they do above and beyond the school day that really give them that extra boost. We see a tremendous difference in the students who read at home and those who do not. Believe me, it is obvious!

I will be sending home a summer packet of suggested reading activities for your children soon. It is extremely important that they read daily throughout the summer so that they continue to develop reading skills, and to ensure retention of those learned at school this year. It doesn't really matter what they read, as long as they read, read, read! Happy Reading!
