DR. MASCHAL'S MESSAGE

It is time to remind everyone of our Mission and Beliefs and to let everyone know about our goals for the 2008-2009 school year. I am including the Stanford 10 test results and comparisons with Mountain Brook Elementary. I hope this will help you understand our purpose and focus for this current school year.

Mission Statement

The mission of Kilby Laboratory School is to provide a safe, stimulating, and cooperative learning environment that promotes cognitive development with an emphasis on thinking, reasoning, and problem solving. Kilby supports and respects students as individuals with unique intellectual, emotional, social, and physical developmental needs. In addition, the school provides opportunities for the University of North Alabama faculty members and students to observe and participate in the active application of current, research-based educational practices.

Belief Statement

The Kilby Laboratory School community believes that students learn best when they:

- Have supportive teachers, administrators, parents, and community members sharing the responsibility of providing a physically and psychologically safe learning environment
- Have equal opportunities to participate in a curriculum that incorporates a variety of learning experiences that accommodate individual learning styles and cultural differences
- Are actively engaged in the learning process toward achieving high standards of excellence
- Create and use a variety of thinking and reasoning strategies in solving problems, making judgments, and becoming reflective learners.

Below are three priority initiatives for the 2008-2009 school year. These have been aligned with the goals of the University.

Priority Initiative 1:

Increase student learning in reading and math 2-3 % points in selected areas as measured by the SAT 10, ARMT, and Scott Foresman Testing Program. Capitalization and punctuation will also be addressed.

Priority Initiative 2:

The faculties of Kilby Laboratory School and College of Education Elementary Department will collaborate to plan, organize, and provide staff development for teachers in the surrounding area school systems in word study, 6-Trait Writing, and technology use in the classroom.

Priority Initiative 3:

Faculty and staff of Kilby Laboratory School will continue to develop processes and procedures to meet and exceed AdvancEd (SACS) Accreditation Standards.

To develop priorities we review our test scores. We have been tracking our Stanford 10 Test results for the past five years and benchmarking with Mountain Brook Elementary.

We are pleased to see that over time we are improving our scores in most instances and are approaching the scores of our benchmark school. In a few cases we have surpassed the comparison scores. Below you will the results over time:

THIRD GRADE NEWS

In science we just finished the AMSTI Earth Materials unit. We have taken mock rocks apart to discover their ingredients. We have compared different kinds of rocks, and performed scratch tests and chemical tests on them. We went on a calcite quest to discover which rocks contained calcite. In our last investigation we identified the minerals in granite. As a follow up, we are now learning about the three kinds of rock and how they form. We will also be learning about the layers of the earth and how the earth changes.

In math, we have begun to learn our multiplication facts and the meaning of multiplication. We have done AMSTI investigations to discover the factors of 20, 24, 36, and 48. We will soon begin more investigations on things that come in groups. Everyone is working hard to learn their facts, so we will be able to do higher level multiplication

and division after Christmas.

Our class is in the process of finishing up an economics unit with Mrs. Christopher and Mrs. Warren. Every day in class we go shopping during math time. We visit pretend stores like Target, Walmart, and Best Buy, where we purchase an item, write a check for it, enter it into our check book and then balance our check book. It's fun to see which of us are big spenders and which are savers!

We have had many fun times this nine weeks. Everyone enjoyed the fall festival and the book fair. We participated in Red Ribbon Week and learned the importance of staying drug free. This has certainly been a busy, fun nine weeks.

Wow! What a great start we have had to our Zimbabwe well project! At the end of October, we had collected \$908.61 in the big water bottle. The largest bill was \$5.00 with most of the amount consisting of nickels, dimes, quarters and what seemed like a zillion pennies.

Incredibly, this amount was collected by only 34 students who turned in their water bottles. In addition, the collection from student art sales was \$312.00. This amount was raised by only 45 students selling their work. Our grand total deposited at the end of October was \$1, 220.61.

Just think what we can do if all 144 Kilby kids sell their art and bring in their water bottles! The cost of digging a well is around \$5,000, and I really believe that we could reach that amount and fund an entire well on our own. As usual, we are capable of doing great things at Kilby.

The winner of the contest to guess how much money was in the big water bottle was Chase Holcombe. Chase's guess was \$700.00 which was the closest without going over the amount. He received a certificate that will give him free admission for a visit to the water slide next summer. We are now having a contest between the boys and girls to see who can fill up their big water bottles first. Currently, the boys are really outdoing the girls.

We had a successful Red Ribbon Week celebration in October. One name from each class was drawn every morning to receive the prize of the day which added a little excitement to our morning assembly in the gym. In each class, I presented information that was designed to help the students make wise choices in their lives with regard to the use of harmful substances. We had some interesting and meaning-

ful discussions that I hope will benefit them in the future, especially as they approach the teenage years.

The Kilby Kids Advisory Board is in full swing. We have had two regularly scheduled meetings and a few called sessions since the beginning of the school year. They have made some important decisions and have addressed some areas of concern for them.

READING NEWS

We began mid-year testing this month with the ThinkLink assessment in grades 2-6. This test predicts student performance on high stakes tests, such as the ARMT and SAT. It also gives us critical information about our students' strengths and weaknesses and helps teachers determine how to target instruction.

Every grade will take the Diagnostic Spelling Assessment (DSA). This will be the first time that the Kindergarten children have taken the DSA. I am eager to see how much they have learned these first few months

of school. Every year I am amazed by how many words they can spell! This test gives us valuable information about a child's word knowledge.

We will conclude mid-year testing in January with the Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) test in grades K-3. The data from DIBELS, ThinkLink, the DSA, and other information provided by the classroom teachers will guide the reading instruction of our students.

If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to ask me. I am always happy to meet with parents and discuss any of the above information, or other concerns you may have about your child's reading progress.

I hope all of you have a wonderful Christmas break and that you are able to spend time with family and friends doing things you enjoy. Take some time out to read with you child each day. Encourage them to use their reading and writing skills to make gifts or cards for someone special!

GIFTED INCLUSION NEWS

We have been busy in 3rd grade preparing for the economics contest that will be coming up after the first of the year. 3rd graders are learning that everything we see, use, and eat in our homes and communities from piggy banks to pineapples can be linked to the economy. Students have been busy learning how to draw various economic concepts such as opportunity cost, wants and needs, and supply and demand. In addition, students have learned about the history of printed money, currency exchange, and saving, spending, and investing money. Also, students have enjoyed online activities that parallel with these concepts. Soon students will be visiting through video the Jelly Belly Factory in order to discover how businesses and industries are created in the United States.

In 4th grade students are studying eight literary devices along with several forms of poetry. Soon we will be online writing poetry with the help of Jack Prelutsky. During this time students are encouraged to write original poetry and send this in to Jack Prelutsky as he reads original poetry created by students weekly. Next, we

will begin to investigate Alabama's rivers, lakes, and streams through various activities. We are building background knowledge in order to prepare the students to write original poetry to be entered in the River of Words Environmental Poetry Contest. The contest is sponsored by the state of Alabama and Auburn University. The contest is designed to promote watershed awareness, literacy, and art among children. Students will explore the natural and cultural history of rivers, lakes, and streams of Alabama and will express these discoveries through art and poetry.

Fifth graders began the year researching and creating a biography report in a teacher created template. Students read AR books and completed online research about their person to obtain the required information. In addition, they learned how to use Citation Maker to create a bibliographic entry. Presently, fifth grade students are studying a unit on the Titanic. They have learned basic facts about icebergs and glaciers and the sinking of the Titanic. Activities include Webquest games, online activities and research, AR books, mov-

ies, and the study of a heroine of the Titanic. Students will learn how this sinking changed history and laws. Finally, they will compare and contrast The Ship of Gold to Titanic.

6th graders began the year researching past presidents and then created a biography of their president on Kidspiration. Then 6th graders held a mock presidential election and helped classes vote online. This activity was reported in the Times Daily. This year is the 100th anniversary of the Model T, and 6th graders have studied the significance of that event. They will compare the significance of the Model T to today's new hybrid cars. As they research and study these, they will take a trip across the United States on Route 66 in order to discover the importance of this highway. They will create travel brochures of tourist sites on Route 66 which will be displayed in the hallway. Look for these soon!
