

Collier Library gets new material

Finding a book or other material acquired by Collier Library recently, won't be difficult.

A list of January 2000 acquisitions can be accessed on the Library's web page. Wayne O'Neal, one of the librarians, says that 446 books, 31 videos, four pieces of computer software, and one new database, entitled "Standard & Poor's Net Advances," are the acquisitions actually catalogued.

People can access materials under the Collier Main division, which covers a variety of subjects from works by Thoreau to Feeling of what happens: body and emotion in the making of consciousness by Antonio R. Damasio.

The Collier Alabama Collection includes materials relating to Black History Month, including White preacher's memoir: the Montgomery Bus Boycott (by Robert S. Graetz).

For economics teachers and students, the Collier Reference section features Value of a dollar: prices and incomes in the United States, 1860-1999 edited by Scott Derks. It also has material for lighter reading including the "World Encyclopedia of Cartoons" edited by Maurice Horn. and "Mascots: The History of Senior College and

University Mascots/Nicknames by Roy E. Yarbrough.

In Popular Reading, there are View from Nashville by Ralph Emery with Patsie Bale Cox for fans of country music and a novel by Jonathan Kellerman entitled "Monster."

The Government Documents section includes information on soil and on diabetes.

Classical music lovers will find the complete piano sonatas of Mozart in the Music Library and Collier Audio-Visual includes two videos of Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet." A version of Dr. Seuss's "Green Eggs and Ham" for interactive multimedia is available in the Audio-Visual part of the Learning Resource Center, and the Kilby School Library has Jet alphabet book by Jerry Pallotta.

O'Neal says that the acquisitions "were actually paid for in December," except for the Government Documents, which are supplied through a depository.

"They come in free," he said.
