## Collier Library Archives adds music to collection

Some 15 original pieces of stemusic signed by W.C. Handy, the "father of the blues" who is from Florence, are among a collection of items that have been donated by Alice Nolen, of Florence, to the Collier Library Archives at the University of North Alabama.

The donation was made in memory of the late Mrs. Gerdes Brown Nolen, of Florence. She is the mother of Alice Nolen's husband Robert, who graduated from Florence State Teachers College in 1940

The items in the collection, which were sent to the late Mrs. Nolen, by Handy include the sheet music for "Beale Street Blues," St. Louis Blues" and "The Memphis Blues," as well as two letters written by Handy, several pictures and a Christmas card.
