**GENERAL STUDIES**

- AR 170** Art Appreciation: A broad study of contemporary visual arts.
- BI 101 & BI 102** Introductory Biology: Biology of plants, animals, and humans; comparative study of human body systems.

### **GENERAL STUDIES - continued**

- COM 201** Fundamentals of Speech: Practical training in public speaking and other communication skills.
- CS 110** Introduction to Computers, **CS 120** Intermediate Computer Topics, and **CIS 125** Business Applications of Microcomputer Software: introduction to basic computer functions and applications.  
CIS 125 is the preferred course for social work majors, but the other two courses are acceptable.
- EC 251** Macroeconomics: Introduction to basic macroeconomic principles including national income, employment, output, and prices.
- EN 111\*** Freshman Composition I: Study of the mechanics of writing and other skills.
- EN 112\*** Freshman Composition II: Continuation of the study of writing. EN 111 is prerequisite.
- EN 211\*** Survey of English Literature: The development of English literature as an expression of English culture from Beowulf through Neoclassism.
- EN 221\*** American Literature through Whitman: Major American poets and prose writers of the period.
- EN 231\*** Literature of the Western World I: Survey of the great literature of western civilization. Prerequisite is completion of EN 112.
- EN 212** Survey of English Literature: A continuation of English 211 from the Pre-Romantics to the present.
- EN 222\*** American Literature from Whitman to the Present: Major American poets and prose writers of the period.
- EN 232\*** Literature of the Western World II: Continuation of EN 231. EN 112 is prerequisite.  
*\*Note: University policy stipulates that students must enroll in required English courses (EN 111, EN 112, EN 231, EN 232) in sequence every semester until all English requirements are satisfied.*
- HI 101 & HI 102** Western Civilization 1 & II: Survey of major western civilizations across time.
- HI 201 & HI 202** United States History I & II: Survey of American history.
- MA 110** Finite Mathematics: Overview of topics in math, focusing on practical applications. Provides foundation for required MA 147. See *Catalog* regarding prerequisites for admission to this course.
- MA 147** Elementary Statistics: Descriptive statistics, probability, and appropriate applications. Must be successfully completed prior to enrolling in SW 370 Methods of Social Work Research.
- MU 222** Music Appreciation I: Chronological study of music terminologies, styles, literature, and forms.
- PHL 201** Introduction to Philosophy: Study of human ideas, including a historical perspective.
- PHL 202** Logic: Study of the methodology of reasoning.
- PHL 205** Ethics: Study of ethics in everyday life with special emphasis on situations arising from the expansion of technology and medicine.
- PS 241** United States Government and Politics: Study of government, federalism, interest groups, and the role of the media.
- PS 242** Contemporary Issues in United States Politics: Examination of current major domestic and foreign policy issues.
- PY 201** General Psychology: Survey of major areas of psychology including learning, physiological bases of behavior, abnormal behavior, and methods of psychology.
- SO 221** Introductory Sociology: Survey of major subject areas and principles of sociology.

### **PRESCRIBED SUPPORTING COURSES (electives; choose 5)**

- COM 306** Interpersonal Communication: Focus on functional interpretation of interpersonal communication in societal, educational, and vocational relationships.
- COM 330** Group Communication: Communication theory and its applications to small groups.
- EN 333** Images of Women in Literature: Study of images in literature and introduction to feminist criticism.
- FL 101\*\*** Introduction to International Studies: Introduction to the analysis of issues which cut across countries and cultures.
- FL 302** Cross Cultural Interaction: A study of the ways in which differences in languages, perceptions, behaviors, social norms and traditions influence how people from different cultures interact.
- GE 260** Human Geography: A conceptual approach to the study of humans, their distribution, economic systems, behavior patterns, value systems and environmental perceptions, with emphasis given to the resulting patterns of cultural landscapes that characterize the earth.
- GE 390** Urban Geography: Study of character and distribution of cities, focusing on trends and patterns.
- HES 362** Child Development: Examines human development from prenatal to kindergarten stage; includes supervised experience in a child development center and participation in home visits.
- HES 443** Family Development: Structure and function of the family, its interaction with other societal institutions, and the effect on all family members.
- HPE 406** Human Sexuality: Focus on the physical, mental, social, and emotional aspects of relationships as they are affected by human sexuality.
- HPE 424** Drugs in American Society: Analysis of the medical, psychological, social and legal dimensions of drug use and abuse in the United States.
- NU 413** Young Child and Health Care: Study of awareness of health problems and needs of young children.

### **PRESCRIBED SUPPORTING COURSES - continued**

- PSY 302** Abnormal Psychology: Study of the origins, developments, and outcomes of deviant behavior.
  - PY 242\*\*** Psychology of Adjustment: The concept of adjustment and factors with influence social and emotional behaviors.
  - SL 499-SW** Departmental Service Learning: This course is designed to provide students the opportunity to integrate academic learning about vital service issues within a specific discipline.
  - SO 222\*\*** Current Social Problems: Study of social issues, especially contemporary American social problems and their consequences.
  - SO 307** Medical Sociology: Study of principles relating to health professions, institutions, and illnesses.
  - SO 330** Juvenile Delinquency: Analysis of the nature, causes, and extent of juvenile delinquency.
  - SO 350** Cultural Anthropology: Methods and theories of cultural anthropology, including ethnographic study of societies throughout the world.
  - SP 103\*\*** Spanish for Professionals: Basic communication skills in Spanish for professions including social work, education, criminal justice, business, and healthcare. (NOTE: as this is not an upper level class, if you choose to take it, be sure you will have enough hours at the 300-400 level to total 50 hours)
  - SW 403\*\*\*** Gerontology: Study of biopsychosocial aspects of aging, and social services. Recommended for all social work majors.
  - SW 415\*\*\*** Ethical Decision Making in Social Work Practice: Focus on development of sensitivity to ethical concerns and value dilemmas in social work practice. Recommended for all social work majors.
  - SW 420\*\*\*** Services to Families and Children: Study of problems and needs of children and families, and social service resources developed to meet the needs. Recommended for all social work majors.
  - SW 491\*\*\*** Selected Topics: Periodically offered, focusing on a topic pertinent to social work practice.
  - WS 323** Women's Health: Study of health promotion and disease prevention for women from adolescence through senescence.
  - WS 354** Global Women's Issues: Study of practices and socio-economic factors that affect women.
- \*\*Only one elective course allowed from 100/200 level courses**  
**\*\*\*Note: All social work electives are strongly recommended as elective courses for social work majors.**

### **SOCIAL WORK COURSES (required)**

- SW 230** Introduction to Social Work: Comprehensive study of the field, focusing on practice settings.
  - SW 305** Social Welfare Policies and Services: Study of historical and contemporary policies, including policy analysis and agencies which provide social services.
  - SW 315** Human Behavior and Social Environment I: Study of the life span from infancy to young adulthood, focusing on biological, psychological, and social functioning. Requires a community field experience.
  - SW 316** Human Behavior and Social Environment II: Study of the life span from middle adulthood through later adulthood, including analysis of biological, psychological, and social functioning.
  - SW 324** Diversity Issues in Social Work: Study of the cultural differences and similarities of diverse populations and relevant issues to social work practice.
  - SW 360** Methods of Social Work Practice I: Study of basic knowledge, values, and skills which are the foundation of generalist social work practice.
  - SW 361** Methods of Social Work Practice II: Integration of practice theory, skills, and professional ethics in social work practice with individuals and families. Requires a community field experience.
  - SW 362** Methods of Social Work Practice III: Practice theory and skills focusing on small groups, communities, planning/development, and administration. Requires a community field experience.
  - SW 370** Methods of Social Work Research: Fundamental research principles and skills as applied to social work practice. Includes participation in a community research project. MA 147 is prerequisite.

- SW 432** Field Instruction in Social Work I: Integration of classroom learning by participation in a supervised 250 hour field placement in a social service agency; weekly seminar. All other coursework must be completed prior to enrollment in internship.
  - SW 433** Field Instruction in Social Work II: Continuation of SW 432, involving an additional 250 hours of field instruction. Completed the same semester as SW 432.

### **GENERAL ELECTIVES – 4 hours (to achieve cumulative total of 128 semester hours)**

General electives are courses which may be chosen from any courses offered at the University. Because at least fifty hours of the required 128 total hours must be completed within 300-400 level courses, it is suggested that general electives be chosen from these classes to ensure the minimum requirement for graduation is met.
