## Department Chair Meeting Minutes College of Arts and Sciences January 28, 2014

The meeting was called to order at 8:02 a.m. on Tuesday, January 28, 2014. Dr. Vagn K. Hansen, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, presided. Department Chairs present: Ms. Chiong-Yiao Chen, Dr. Paul Kittle, Dr. Brent Olive, LTC (retired) Wayne Bergeron for Dr. Yaschica Williams, Dr. Larry Adams, Dr. Claudia Vance, Dr. Francis Koti, Dr. Christopher Maynard, Dr. Cindy Stenger, LTC Michael Snyder, Dr. David McCullough, Dr. Richard Hudiburg, Dr. Brenda Webb, Dr. Joy Borah, and Dr. Jerri Bullard. Debbie Tubbs took the minutes.

- 1. **Approval of Minutes from January 14, 2014**. The minutes were approved by consensus.
- 2. Curriculum Change Proposal from the Department of Mathematics. Dr. Stenger made a motion to create a new course, MA 100E (4) Intermediate Algebra and inactivate MA 099 (0) Beginning Algebra. The motion was seconded, discussed, and adopted.
- 3. **Curriculum Change Proposals from the Department of English.** Dr. Adams made a motion to create a new certificate in Professional Writing. The motion was seconded, opened for discussion, and adopted.
  - Dr. Adams made a motion to create a new minor in HCI/UX in Professional Writing. The motion was seconded, opened for discussion, and adopted.
  - Dr. Adams made a motion for revision in the current minor in English/Professional Writing by adding EN 310W and EN 355W; deleting from the required component EN 439W; changing the number of hours in elective component writing courses to six; adding to the elective component writing courses EN 334W, EN 396W, EN 435W, EN 439W, EN 440W, and EN 490; and deleting from the elective component EN 393W, COM 220, COM 215, COM 370, COM 410, and MG 382W. The motion was seconded, opened for discussion, and adopted.
  - Dr. Adams made a motion for revision in Option II: Professional Writing by changing the professional writing required component, changing the writing intensive course requirements, including hours required, deletion of courses, and addition of already existing courses; and the deletion of one of the optional courses from the language/history or language/rhetoric three hour requirement. The motion was seconded, opened for discussion, and adopted.
- 4. **Cindy Stenger 3MT.** Dr. Stenger explained that 3MT is Three Minute Thesis (3MT<sup>TM</sup>) is a research communication competition developed by The University of Queensland which challenges research higher degree students to present a compelling oration on their thesis and its significance in just three minutes in language appropriate to a non-specialist audience. With University of Queensland's permission, UNA is going to offer an undergraduate version of 3MT in association with our Research Week. A representative from Arts & Sciences will be contacting your department with information regarding 3MT. A short overview includes each department that chooses to participate should have competition and announce a winner by February 28. Each college should have competition

and announce a winner by March 21. UNA's research competition will be held on April 9. Training sessions regarding these competitions will be held next week. If all departments cannot participate this year, then they can plan on participating next year. Dr. Bullard mentioned that APD is participating in a round-table research-based discussion on April 23 and hope to be able to plan to join in 3MT next year based on these discussions.

- 5. **Grade Changes**. Dr. Hansen shared that our office is now notified whenever grades are changed and he has observed a large number of these changes and wondered if department chairs are aware of these grade changes. A number of department chairs shared that they have noticed or are aware of more pressure from students on faculty to change grades. Dr. Hansen stated he would like this topic to be addressed when copies of current policies from the *Faculty Handbook* and *Undergraduate* and *Graduate Catalogs* are researched. It was suggested that there be a Workflow process for a change in transcript such as change of grades so that the instructor, department chair, dean, etc. are aware of these changes.
- 6. **Report from COAD.** Dr. Hansen reported that the following topics were discussed:
  - -Commencement regrouping is being discussed with a suggested pairing of A&S and Nursing for the morning Commencement ceremony and Education and Business for the afternoon Commencement ceremony in order to even out attendance. [During this discussion department chairs brought up the fact that some students will have to choose which ceremony they wish to attend by listing either B.S./B.A. or B.S.Ed. first on their graduation application. This led to further discussion of double-majors versus the new catalog (2013-2014) designation of B.S.Ed. and CIP codes as it relates to advising and graduation.]
  - -Dr. Hansen stated that on Saturday, February 15 the Office of Advancement will hold a meeting with UNA supporters and potential supporters. The deans have been asked to hold break-out sessions with these supporters and Dr. Hansen would like to ask department chairs to work with him in these break-out sessions for two reasons. The first reason is for continuity as we transition from the current dean to the new dean. The second reason is that in our college the department chair is the face that a donor would respond to in many cases. He stated that he will send out something by email but in the meantime to please let him know if you are interested and available on February 15.
  - -Dr. Hansen shared that he has invited Craig Robertson to meet with this group in two weeks to discuss the Interdisciplinary and Continuing Education programming that is now directing. [Discussion of this topic included observations that offering credit through CE could adversely affect our summer school attendance/revenue and that CE is free to offer courses at various price ranges for participation and various salaries for instructors' pay whereas tuition costs and salaries are mandated to us.]

The meeting adjourned at 9:25 a.m.

# II. COURSE INFORMATION

- A. Intermediate Algebra Enhanced, MA 100E, 4 Semester Hours
- B. Course Description:

Principles and techniques of elementary algebra; products, factors, and quotients of polynomials; operations with rational expressions, ratio and proportion; rectangular coordinate system; systems of equations and inequalities; roots and radicals; second–degree equations; the quadratic formula. The 4 credit hours will allow more time to develop and master the principles and techniques of elementary algebra.

## C. Course Objectives:

This course is intended to refresh the student's memory of beginning algebra and to expose the student to additional aspects of algebra and its applications in the scientific and business world. This course also provides the student necessary mathematical background and skills for the study of pre-calculus algebra or elementary statistics.

## D. Course Content:

Properties of Real numbers, exponents, polynomials, factoring, roots and radicals, rational expressions, linear equations, quadratic equations, linear inequalities, linear systems.

#### MATHEMATICS (MA)

MA 099. (0) **Beginning Algebra.** A noncredit course in basic math ematics and introductory algebra required of all students with scores of 15 or below on the ACT Mathematics Subtest whose major requires MA 112. Except as noted below, no other mathematics course may be taken until a grade of S is earned in MA 099. May also serve as a refresher or begin ning course in mathematics for other students. Counts as three semester hours in determining hour load. Grading is S (Satisfactory) or U (Unsatisfactory). Students may be exempted only by approval of the Department of Mathematics. A student receiving a grade of U must repeat the course. After the second term in MA 099 the student, no matter what the grade, must proceed to the credit sequence beginning with MA 100. In the case of a complete withdrawal, a grade of WS, Withdrawal Satisfactory, or WU, Withdrawal Unsatisfactory, will be assigned. Grades of WS or WU have no effect on the student's scholastic standing. (Fall, Spring)

MA 100. (3) Intermediate Algebra. This course is required of all students whose major requires MA 112 and whose score ranges from 16-21 on the ACT Mathematics Subtest. Principles and techniques of elementary algebra; products, factors, and quotients of polynomials; oper- ations with rational expressions; ratio and proportion; rectangular coordi- nate system; systems of equations and inequalities; roots and radicals; second-degree equations; and the quadratic formula. Prerequisite: minimum ACT mathematics score of 16 and one unit of high school algebra, or sat isfactory completion of MA 099 Not open to students with credit in MA 100E. (Fall, Spring, Summer)

MA 100E. (34) Intermediate Algebra Enhanced. This course is required of all students whose major requires MA 112 and whose score is 15 or below on the ACT Mathematics Subtest. This course covers principles and techniques of elementary algebra, products, factors, and quotients of polynomials, operations with rational expressions, ratio and proportion, rectangular coordinate system, systems of equations, and the quadratic formula. To enhance the course, additional material has been added from elementary algebra. Students who successfully complete MA 100E will not be allowed to register for the traditional Intermediate Algebra course (MA 100). (Fall, Spring)

MA 105. (3) Mathematics for Liberal Arts. This course emphasizes the breadth of application of contemporary mathematics to modern socie- ty. It is intended primarily for the liberal arts major. Topics covered include charts, graphs, compound interest, problem solving, sets, probability, and statistics. (Fall, Spring, Summer)

MA 110. (3) Finite Mathematics. This course is intended to give an overview of topics in finite mathematics together with their applications and is taken primarily by students who are not majoring in science, engineer- ing, commerce, or mathematics (i.e., students who are not required to take calculus). The course includes sets, counting, permutations, combinations, basic probability (including Bayes' Theorem), an introduction to statistics (including work with Binomial Distributions and Normal Distributions), matrices and their applications to Markov chains and decision theory. Additional topics may include symbolic logic, linear models, linear program- ming, the simplex method and applications. Prerequisite: minimum mathe- matics ACT score of 22 and credit in high school Algebra I, Algebra II, and Geometry; or grade of C or better in Intermediate Algebra; or Mathematics for Liberal Arts (MA 105 is preferable to MA 100). (Fall, Spring, Summer)

\*MA 111. (3) Crucial Skills in Mathematics. This course empha- sizes mastery of foundational skills and facts in mathematics in the con- text of problem solving. Topics include understanding and composing logically correct arguments, using abstract mathematical thinking and improving problem solving ability. It is intended for majors that do not require calculus or statistics. Students will complete a significant project that applies mathematics to their field of interest. (Fall, Spring, Summer)

Law Enforcement Academic Certificate. The Department of Criminal Justice offers a Law Enforcement Academic Certificate for practicing professionals in the criminal justice system. The certificate serves to enhance professional skills and maximize promotional opportunities while also satisfying state-mandated training requirements. The certificate is comprised of six advanced courses designed to broaden knowledge of the organizational, investigative and legal components of law enforcement work (all credits count toward the requirements for a degree in criminal justice at UNA). One night course is offered each fall and spring semester at an offcampus site selected for professional convenience. Persons enrolled in certificate courses must be employed by a criminal justice agency, possess a high school diploma or GED, and be admitted to the University.
