### Course Objectives

The prospective music teacher shall demonstrate skills, insights and knowledge of techniques of teaching elementary school music. Specific objectives are to develop and demonstrate competencies and knowledge of:

#### **Evaluation**

Students will be tested on course objectives and other material covered in class through written exams. Evaluation of other assignments, including in-class lesson teaching, school-setting teaching, the philosophy of music project, participation in field experiences and attendance will be included in the student's final grade.
