AR 493(3) Professional Practices in Art

Class Time: Fridays 9:00 am-11:45 am, Tuesdays 5-7:45 pm. Approved by the University Curriculum Committee on March, 8, 2012 Implementation begins Fall 2013

Course Description

Through a blend of reading, research and hands-on activities, this course focuses on practical issues concerning art students' readiness to enter the marketplace at the onset of their early professional lives in the field of visual art and design. This course is a mandatory course for BFA and BS/ED degrees but also offered as an elective for BS and BA degrees. (Junior Standing; Fall, Spring)

Course Objectives

- Learn future career and educational options beyond the undergraduate study.
- Understand how an artist/designer functions as a professional while maintaining personal creative productivity.
- Demonstrate advanced abilities in one area of art production or art theory.
- Gain working knowledge and skills relating to exhibitions, critiques and curatorial practices.
