Course Policies and Procedures

Overview and Learning Outcomes

HI 603 – This course is designed to provide an introduction to the theory and practice of teaching history at the advanced secondary and post-secondary level with strong emphasis on course development, information delivery and assessment. This course is will have hands-on activities and will focus on practical applications of information.

- Students will demonstrate the ability to organize a course, including the development of a syllabus, learning outcomes, assessment design, and teaching strategies for organizing and implementing specific lesson plans using current technology.
- Students will demonstrate familiarity with eh teaching profession through 15 hours of classroom observation and classroom teaching (Graduate students in the College of Education will complete 15 hours of classroom observation and classroom teaching at the 6-12 level under the direction of a current 6-12 teacher holding a master's level certificate in history or social science).

<u>Standard</u>

Assessment

Students will develop a syllabus for an appropriate secondary social science course using the AL Course of Study standards. Students will use a single standard to develop a lesson for use in a secondary social science classroom under the direction of a highly qualified certified teacher.

Student behavior

Students are expected to behave appropriately by arriving prior to the start of class and refraining from disrupting the class (except in an emergency). Students will not use cell phones or blackberries to call or to text. Portable music devices are also not allowed. Items such as these should not be out during class. Students who fail to conduct themselves appropriately will be asked to leave and counted absent for the class.

Course assessment and grading

Students will complete a series of smaller projects for this course that will culminate in a portfolio. Additionally, students will be required to participate actively in classroom discussions and in online forums.
