The basic elements of scoring for orchestral instruments will be introduced in a systematic and logical manner. UNA students and faculty members will be asked to demonstrate the practical aspects of instruments.

COURSE CONTENT:

The study of instruments and instrumentation, also the process of scoring for instruments is a necessary skill for teachers of instrumental and vocal/choral music. The students will learn, by the process of listening and writing practice, to assess the colors and ranges of orchestral instruments, and to write for them, using standard scoring methods. For implementing the compositional aspect of the course, they have to write a 16 measure original composition for string orchestra.

EVALUATION/GRADING:

For course objective 3, four tests will be given during the semester and considered test grades. Also home assignments from the workbook will be given, each worth 1 point towards the final grade. The strings composition will be worth 3 points. The final project, in fulfillment of objectives 2 and 3, is a scoring assignment for a full symphony orchestra which has to be turned in on or before the last day of the class. That assignment will have to be done on Sibelius program.
