The standards include a pre-test, a safety and security self-assessment, and an external assessment and post-test. Emphasis will be given toward getting more teachers, schools, and even school systems involved in a large research project. Ideally it is hoped this program could become a voluntary accreditation program for school safety and security that schools and districts could decide to pursue. Information will also be given on bullying, gang influence prevention and other topics.
