The teachers have changed the report cards. We hope that the changes will give you the information you need about your child's progress without overwhelming you with too many details. If you have any comments or suggestions, please let me know. Eventually, we hope to be able to put this information online as the surrounding school systems do.

We are very excited about the Lion Alert system. If you have not registered for this system, please let me know right away. This computerized program will call all of our parents with messages about any emergency at Kilby. You must register online using the information your child brought home on September 24. If you do not register, you will not receive communications about emergency early dismissals, weather closings etc. If you did not receive the registration information, please call me right away so we can get you registered.

Just a reminder that lunch money is due by the 10th of each month. At this time, you should have already paid for August, September, and October. The payment for November is due on October 10. This will help us keep all of our student accounts in the black. We are not supposed to let students charge lunch, so it is necessary to keep ahead of the game.

I would like to thank everyone for their patience with us this year. I know it has been difficult to reach us at times, but we do not always have coverage in the office when Mrs. Anderton is out due to illness. We do attempt to have someone here at all times, but sometimes it does not work out.

If you want to contact us about a change in student pickup or having your child stay for after school, it is best to call before 1:30. If your child is going home with another student, we need to have a note from you (this includes dismissal from the after school program.) It can be very confusing at dismissal time, and we need to know where you want your child to go. So please send a note if your child is going with a neighbor or spending the night with a friend.

Kindergarten News

A new group of students has arrived!

These kids have made the big adjustment of beginning "real school." Though a little timid at first, I believe everyone has reached their comfort level, and now individual personalities are coming out. They are bright, funny, and kind.

We started reading immediately after school began. The children are building on their knowledge of letters and sounds. They are beginning to understand how sounds and letters connect to form words. I am very impressed with their progress. They get so excited when they learn a new word or have an "ah-ha" moment.

The children have been doing AMSTI investigations on balls and ramps. They have enjoyed this unit and have created some complex ramps that allowed them to explore the different behaviors of balls as they roll down inclines, through tunnels, up hills, and around bends. This science module provided them the opportunity to use a variety of science thinking and process skills through exploration, discovery, and problem solving.

During our study of patterns in math, the students have begun to identify, predict, create, extend, and discuss patterns. Their favorite activity was making hopscotch paths in the gym and recording their hopscotch pattern onto paper.

Kindergarten is a year of transitions. We've gotten through the first transition, and everyone is doing well. Their worlds are expanding. They have 17 new friends to play and learn with. This is an exciting year for them as they grow socially, emotionally and developmentally. This is an exciting year for us as we watch them grow and as we grow with them.

Fab First-graders

What a fabulous first nine weeks we have had in first grade. As soon as these children hit the door in August, we were off and running. We have a new reading series from Scott Foresman called "Reading Street," so we plunged right in with the first unit learning all about tame and wild animals. Our phonics lessons have centered around the short vowel sounds, but our reader comes with a variety of books at different levels in order to meet the needs of all of our children. Writing is also integrated into this reading program, so we have been writing stories and doing research about various animals. We are already about to wrap up our first of five books for this year, and it has been amazing to see the progress these children have made in such a short time.

In math and science, we are using AMSTI. AMSTI is an acronym for Alabama Math Science and Technology Institute, and the lessons are designed for students to do more investigative type of learning. In math, our lessons have focused on addition and subtraction by using games with cards and number cubes. Each lesson begins with about a 15-20 minute instruction time, and then the students move into groups to practice what was taught. The children seem to love it, and the learning that is taking place requires them to really think and apply what they already know.

Our science unit has revolved around a study of new plants. We have grown brassica seeds, rye grass, and alfalfa seeds. We have rooted ivy stems and also had to cut out grass, only to watch it grow again. The AMSTI curriculum is very hands on and requires a lot of observation by the

Continued from page 2 students as they document what is actually taking place through the investigations. Some things that we take for granted as adults are investigated on a deeper level to see the "how's and why's" of our environment.

In social studies we have been doing a unit on map and globe skills. It is very confusing for children to understand the big concepts of where our town, state, country, continent, and our planet all fit into this world. It has been fun to take a look back through history to see how we got to where we are today.

As you can see, our days are packed full, but we have fun while we are learning. We are singing songs, reading stories, taking AR tests, and we even make time for our favorite subjects – recess, P.E., and lunch! It is an absolute pleasure to work with these fabulous first graders every day because they come to school every day with the best attitudes and eager to learn. I know this is because of such supportive and involved parents. I thank them all so much and I am looking forward to a wonderful year with these children and their families.

Third-grade News


The first nine weeks of school has been full of excitement and learning. Everyone has settled in to the third-grade routine and has been working hard to do their best.

We finally solved the mystery of the unknown powders in our AMSTI unit, Chemical Tests. It was really fun to watch the powders bubble and change color as we tested them with different liquids. The heat test amazed us as we watched some of the powders burn. Everyone did a good job working together and recording their observations.

The third grade has been doing a unit in class and with Mrs. Christopher and Mrs. Warren on economics. We have enjoyed many activities about consumers, producers, goods and services. We have learned about scarcity, opportunity cost, bartering and using money. This unit was further developed in our reading unit entitled, "Dollars and Sense." The stories we read helped us develop concepts about the value of money, when is it important, and how it affects our lives. We have read books, watched videos, and done computer activities related to this topic. The class especially enjoyed the United States Mint website for kids.

Last week, the UNA basketball team visited and read stories to the class. The children really enjoyed their visit and were excited to get their autographs.

We completed a study on animal classification at the beginning of school and are now beginning a unit on ecosystems with Miss Burgess, our student intern. Miss Burgess joined our class in late August and has really been an asset to our class. She begins her solo teaching this week and we know she will do a great job.



Fourth-grade News

Fourth Graders are happy that we have six new classmates: Jacob Adams, Abby Clare Clark, James Green, Joseph Green, Will Letson, and Goldie O'Connor. Also, our UNA intern, Ms. Seino, has come to UNA all the way from Japan!

Science began this year with investigations of living things. We used cooperative learning groups to construct models of animal cells. Our AMSTI electricity unit taught us about how electrons move toward protons in a circuit. We made switches in order to turn light bulbs on and off. Our final project was designing and wiring houses with at least one lighted room. The hallway display has pictures of us working on our science.

Our Alabama History studies took us back to Prehistoric times. We took a field trip to the Florence Indian Mound Museum. Mrs. Adams, our guide, taught us how to use a handmade drill. The class used this educational trip to write a five- paragraph expository essay during Language class.

Another history class project these nine weeks was to use modeling clay to recreate Indian artifacts from our studies. We are studying Alabama Territory and Statehood.

In Reading class, we are using new textbooks. Our latest story was narrative nonfiction about Yosemite National Park. We were lucky to see photographs of a classmate's family trip to Yosemite.

We appreciate all Kilby families who are contributing aluminum drink cans to our recycling project. Fourth-graders will be at the front door each morning to collect cans.

So far, we have collected \$77.00 that will be used for our two-day Alabama History trip to Montgomery.

Fifth-grade News

Fifth-graders have spent the first six weeks sharpening old skills and learning new ones. We have worked on increasing our speed and efficiency on basic math facts. We have also practiced number sequences, writing word problems as equations, and using fraction pieces to identify percentage equivalents.

Our first unit in reading was about how people meet and overcome challenges. In the process of learning about this topic, we worked to increase vocabulary and reading speed and to improve comprehension skills. We have been studying life science subjects, such as cells and body systems, plant and animal classification, inherited characteristics of plants and animals, and plant adaptations. We've examined early civilizations, and we have traveled with explorers as they searched for new lands.

Practicing using our laptop computers has been one of our favorite activities. We have worked to improve our typing skills, accuracy, and search capabilities. In preparation for the Alabama Direct Assessment of Writing, we have practiced writing good paragraphs and are putting it all together to construct essays. Finally, fifthgraders are working to reach their AR goals for the first nine weeks. About half of the class has reached their goals.

For the past five weeks, we have had Miss Emily Anderton as our student intern. She has worked diligently guiding the class during her stay. The students enjoyed doing research on an explorer, writing a skit about him, and then performing the skit. Miss Anderton videotaped the skits and compiled a DVD of them. The class is anticipating watching all of the acting performances and seeing the amazing costumes! We all appreciate the fine work Miss Anderton has done with our class.

Sixth-grade News

I am really enjoying my sixth grade class!

Sixth-graders were very excited to have UNA athletes read to us. Afterwards, we were able to ask them many questions. We appreciate those players who took time out of their busy schedules. GO LIONS!

We welcomed Mr. Hudson on August 20. He is teaching us about planets in science. Our AMSTI activities that correlate with his unit are out of this world!

In reading, we have a new basal textbook with new stories we have really enjoyed. We have four different groups visiting several different stations daily to help increase fluency and comprehension. In addition, we are reading "Hatchet" by Gary Paulsen. Sixth-graders are learning a lot about Brian Robeson and his will to survive the Canadian wilderness. The adventures in this book always keep us in suspense and wanting to read ahead!

Sixth-graders are busy at work on a school-wide presidential mock election. On October 30, the students of Kilby will become "registered voters" and will choose their favorite candidate for president. Happy voting!

We had a great turnout for parent conferences. It was great to see all of you again. Thank you so much for all of your support and help. I truly believe that this is going to be a fun, exciting, and productive year for our 2009 graduates!

In August, we administered the DIBELS (Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills) test to our kindergarten through third-grade students. This is the first time that 93% of our students reached or exceeded the Benchmark score. I believe that this is because of all the hard work of our excellent teachers last year and the fact that so many of our students read over the summer.

In September, members of the UNA basketball team read to your child's class. Students in Ms. Lawler's third-grade class were the first group to host these young men. It's always such a treat when we have local celebrities affirm the importance of reading by sharing a good book with us. Thanks to Coach Wright and Coach Champagne for bringing the athletes into our school.

Another activity the students seemed to enjoy was a tempo (speed of music) game we played like "Red Light, Green Light." The tempos we used were Presto, Allegro, Andante, and Largo. We have also enjoyed some musical scarf activities. I enjoyed seeing all of the brightly colored scarves moving in time with the music! Playing fun music games with physical activity seems to be a hit with our students.

Our first composer study was on Johann Sebastian Bach. We listened to a creative story from Susan Hammond's Classical Kids Collection about Bach coming to visit a modern day girl named Elizabeth. In this story, Bach talks about life 300 years ago, his love for the organ, why he was put in jail, his 20 children, how he walked 520 miles to study organ, and so much more. The children really enjoyed listening to the story and learned so much about Bach. Please ask your child(ren) what they know about Bach. You might be surprised about how much they know! We will study Beethoven after the Christmas Program.
