Actions/Improvements: 5. Service-learning is required of WS 100 (Introduction to WS) and

WS 495 (Senior Seminar) students. WS 100 students perform 15 hours of service learning at the Center for WS; WS 495 students are required to perform 65 service-learning hours—students identify and complete service-learning projects with local civic organizations (e.g. Help Center of the Shoals, Rape Response, Safeplace, etc.) and at the Center for WS. The Center's involvement and sponsorship of The Clothesline Project and Take Back the Night brought attention and increased campus and community awareness about sexual assault and domestic violence. Throughout the year students collected supplies for Safeplace, Rape Response, Helen's Closet (a women's clothing boutique sponsored by the March of Dimes and Helen Keller Hospital), and Heavenly Grace Ministries' Men's

Director worked with Northwest Alabama Community Network and the Lauderdale County Health Department in completing HIV Rapid

Shelter (Sheffield). Additionally, the Center's Coordinator and

Actions/Improvements:

WS student-led projects included: The Clothesline Project and Take Back the Night event (October 20) to increase campus and community awareness about sexual assault and domestic violence (85 people made t-shirts for The Clothesline Project. Approximately 100 people attended and participated in Take Back the Night). Additionally, students in the WS 495 course (Senior Seminar) initiated service-learning projects with the Help Center of the Shoals, Rape Response, and Safeplace. WS students organized the "Jeans for Justice" campaign and were successful in making UNA the leader in contributions throughout the Shoals (\$258 collected for Rape Response). Students produced and performed in Ntosake Shange's play, For Colored Girls who have Considered Suicide when the Rainbow is Enuf.

academic year. The speakers who presented programs represented community and civic organizations that included Rape Response (presented monthly programs on a variety of topics), Safeplace, Help Center of the Shoals, Northwest Alabama Community Network Group and Lauderdale County Health Department, Alabama

Cooperative Extension Service, Women's Clinic of the Shoals, and the Northwest Alabama Community Health and Dental Clinic.

included: a "Bead for Life" party (international fair trade

organization that markets jewelry made by Ugandan women)—the Center raised \$3274 for the Bead for Life organization. The Center sponsored a production of Ntosake Shange's play, For Colored Girls who have Considered Suicide when the Rainbow is Enuf--\$950 was raised and donated to Rape Response of the Shoals. The Clothesline Project and Take Back the Night allowed speakers and audience members to give personal testimony of their experiences with sexual and domestic violence. The "Jeans for Justice" campaign (January 24) collected \$258 for Rape Response. Additionally, WS 495 (Senior Seminar) students performed service-learning projects with local community agencies (Help Center of the Shoals, Safeplace, Rape Response). The Center supported Safeplace's "Walk-a-Mile-for-a-Child" by registering participants and collecting donations. The Center also worked with the Northwest Alabama Community Health

and Dental Clinic in promoting "Women's Health Week."
