STUDENT ENGAGEMENT

The Office of Student Engagement sponsored some of the largest events in UNA history during the 2022-2023 academic year. FRATERNITY & SORORITY LIFE



Programming for this academic year focused on career building, hazing prevention, and sexual assault awareness, all of which are extremely relevant topics for today's student population. Additionally, this year marks the 50th anniversary of Fraternity and Sorority Life at UNA. This provides an opportunity to establish strong lines of communication with alumni across the country in hopes of establishing stronger connections within the UNA Greek Alumni network.

- The 50th anniversary of Fraternity & Sorority Life at UNA began in 2023.
 - In Spring 2023, three CPH sororities (Alpha Delta Pi, Phi Mu, and Zeta Tau Alpha) celebrated their 50th anniversaries of being chartered at UNA.
 - Five IFC fraternities (Alpha Tau Omega, Kappa Sigma, Phi Gamma Delta, Pi Kappa Alpha, and Sigma Chi) will celebrate their 50th anniversaries in 2024.
 - Homecoming 2023 will feature the 50th anniversary of FSL at UNA, including programming at the homecoming celebration on Friday, September 29th, and a dedicated Greek Alumni Tent at homecoming on September 30th. This collaboration is possible through a partnership with the Offices of Alumni Relations and Advancement.
 - A formal celebration is in the planning process now, with an estimated date for the event being late Spring 2024.

- 11% (282/2,664) of undergraduate men are fraternity members.
- 48% (394/820) of fraternity/sorority members earned 3.5 or higher GPAs.
- 21% (175/820) of fraternity/sorority members earned 4.0 GPAs.













Recruitment Updates

- **Panhellenic Preview Day** was Saturday, April 22, and over 60 potential recruitment registrants along with their families toured the Appleby East and West chapter floors and met each of the chapters.
- CPH Recruitment takes place on campus September 1-4, 2023.
 - Evaluated and moved formal recruitment dates back to increase potential new member enrollment in the recruitment process.
- Four NPHC chapters (Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc., and Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc.) added new members in Spring 2023.
- Kappa Alpha Order began its expansion efforts in Spring 2023, and staffers from their headquarters will continue to be on campus in Fall 2023 to recruit new members and begin the chartering process.
- Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., is in the process of returning to campus as an active organization, and they will be recruiting new members to reinstate the chapter in Fall 2023.
- NPHC held a **Yard Show** on February 27 and raised \$1,500 for their council.







Programming Highlights

- **Resume Building Event**, March 7: The University Success Center and the Office of Student Conduct were present to educate members on proper resume formatting and to provide information on other topics, including social media etiquette, with the goal of assisting members in obtaining post-graduate careers.
- Sexual Assault Awareness Month Care Packaging Event, April 11: Chapters donated hygiene items throughout the semester and assembled care packages at the event that were then donated to One Place of the Shoals.
- Alpha Sigma Phi fraternity has been approved by their Grand Council to charter (expansion efforts began in Spring of 2021) and will officially become the Kappa Pi chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi with an installation ceremony taking place in the Fall 2023 semester.
- Hosted inaugural **Greek Graduation Celebration** on May 10 to help transition graduating seniors into their alumni or graduate chapters.
 - Awarded President and Mrs. Kitts with the inaugural Fraternity and Sorority Life Campus Champion award to recognize their support and dedication to FSL at UNA.
 - Awarded **Greek Cup** to Phi Mu in recognition of their achievement in obtaining the highest number of Greek Points throughout the academic year.









GUC OPERATIONS & EVENT MANAGEMENT

The Guillot University Center (GUC) welcomed over 60,000 guests in 2022-2023 including those attending University Program Council (UPC) events, Registered Student Organization (RSO) events, GUC Haunted Halloween, the Peace Tree celebration, the Esports Smash Brothers Tournament, and many annual banquets and induction ceremonies.

Game Room

- Created an oversight committee (including student representation, Housing & Residence Life, International Affairs, Kinesiology, and the UPC) to oversee expenditures and expand outreach to the campus community
- Began promoting the Game Room as a casual opportunity for faculty and staff to engage with students
- Purchased a PS5 game system and surveyed for more popular games to offer the students
- Identified an inaccessibility issue for students with mobile disabilities and took steps to rectify the entrance issues with the addition of a chair lift beginning May 15, 2023
- The Lion's Den hosted 9 tournaments and 3 events/parties. Tournaments had an average of 7 competing teams with 12 teams visiting/supporting/playing other games. Events/parties averaged an attendance of 28 students, with Halloween parties averaging 41 people.

Mail Room

- Completed a self-study to identify areas for improving services and streamlining operations by tracking all packages through one service
- Switched to cashless operations
- Identified areas of structural and cosmetic improvements to increase quality of service, beginning phase one May 15

Guillot University Center

- Purchased cameras to create an in-house offering of Zoom and Teams Meetings in the Performance Center without the need to engage members of the IT staff
- Installed signage (**Robert M. Guillot University Center**) to identify the building and assist guests in locating offices and resources





HOUSING & RESIDENCE LIFE

Housing & Residence Life (HRL) welcomed a record-setting number of residential students in the 2022-2023 academic year. Over 2,000 students representing athletics, the Honors College, 50+ different countries, and a wide variety of academic studies chose to make the campus of North Alabama their home. This exciting increase of students allowed us to expand our housing selection by adding three additional properties as options for students. HRL strives to encourage and enable our students to become academically successful, engaged, and socially responsible representatives of UNA.

Notable Programs

- After The Fire: All first-time residential students were educated on the importance of fire safety in residential facilities. Two survivors of the Seton Hall fire in 2000 shared their story of bravery, resilience, and appreciation. They spoke of the medical providers who saved their lives and how this applies to our students and their selected areas of study.
- Playfair: This event welcomed 700+ students on their first weekend of living at UNA. It is an opportunity for students to make friends and form connections immediately upon their arrival.
- Hallowed Grounds: Contributions of Black faculty, staff, and students were highlighted across campus. These included vignettes of Dean Minnette Ellis, Trustee Wendell W. Gunn, Kiana Joseph, Bobby Joe Pride, Ernestine Davis, and the enslaved individuals that were instrumental in building LaGrange College.
- Legacy Museum: 25 students traveled to Montgomery, AL, to visit the Legacy Museum: From Enslavement to Mass Incarceration and the Civil Rights Memorial Center.
- **UServe**: This partnership with Student Engagement and the Mitchell-West Center for Social Inclusion allowed students to explore service and community engagement opportunities at a variety of locations within the Shoals.
- Pop-Up Advising: Housing & Residence Life partnered with the University Success Center each semester to offer advising within the residential areas. This allowed students to seek resources in their area of comfort at times of day that were outside normal operating hours. This was a very successful academic initiative that we look forward to developing further.

Noala Heights

• Noala Heights opened in August 2022. This provided more than 100 beds for our graduate international students.

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Cypress Flats

• Cypress Flats Buildings 1 and 2 opened in August 2022. These luxury apartments housed 20 students in 2022–2023 with another 28 beds coming in Fall 2023.



Noble's Crossing

• Noble's Crossing Building 1 opened in August 2022. These newly renovated apartments housed 24 students in 2022–23 with another 24 beds available in Fall 2023.



Bellamy Florence

• Entered into a temporary partnership with Bellamy Florence for the 2022-2023 academic year.



Cedar Arms

• Formed an agreement with the private owner of newly renovated property Cedar Arms. This development is within walking distance of campus and will house 48 students.



Gilbert Court

• Formed an agreement with the private owner of newly renovated Gilbert Court to transition property to student housing. This property is also within walking distance of campus and will house 48 students.





DISABILITY SUPPORT SERVICES

The 2022-2023 academic year brought change and growth to the Disability Support Services (DSS) office unlike ever before. We started the academic year with 401 students registered with the office and ended the year with 370 students registered giving us a success rate of 81.8%. Over the course of the academic year, 69 students graduated. Not only did DSS increase the number of individual sessions held with students but DSS also provided group coaching and educational programs.

The DSS office hosted 128 programmatic events and 2,015 in-office individual and group combined appointments. A variety of topics were thoughtfully planned and presented to meet students' needs. It continues to be the goal of the DSS office to bring awareness to disability, diversity, inclusion, and equity to our campus community.

Mentoring Program

- 24.3% (90) of students served by DSS are registered with the mentoring program.
- The purpose of DSS Peer Mentoring is to empower students with disabilities to excel in academics and areas of personal growth. Students increase their skill and ability to handle interpersonal relationships, communication, time management, organization, problem-solving, and critical thinking. The program also encourages students to become selfreliant, develop leadership skills, and practice self-advocacy by building positive relationships.

Significant Accomplishments

- \$433,558 in free services to students and employees
 Including \$30,512 in free mental health services for students
- \$23,460 in direct savings to employees (difference between \$5 office visit and \$35 co-pay)
- Over \$78,000 in **employee office visits savings** to UNA insurance plan (does not include reduced cost services and medications)
- Graduate Assistant position developed through a partnership with the Department of Kinesiology and the Health and Well-Being Collective
- Launched National College Health Assessment (NCHA) for the first time at UNA in Fall 2022. This data is imperative to help execute data-driven decisions and programming under the Health Promoting University framework.
- The **Healthy Lion Council** (relaunched in Fall 2022) worked alongside the Health & Well-Being Collective. This registered student organization develops, plans, and assists with programming and health promotions across campus during the fall and spring semesters.
- A Medication Safety Drop Box installed on campus allows for safe disposal of prescription medications, was made possible through a grant opportunity with the Alabama Extension Office and a partnership with the UNA Police Department.
- **Research collaboration** with Anderson College of Nursing and Health Professions (ACONHP) faculty: Utilization of a Screening Protocol to Increase Chlamydia Screening Rates in Female Patients in a University Clinic.
- **Health Services Clinic** relocated to the Garden Level of the Wilson Medical Arts Building in December 2022.







- 154 patients completed the voluntary and anonymous survey.
- 93% of respondents indicated they were satisfied or very satisfied with their appointment at Health Services.
- 87% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that the services they received from Health Services made it easier to achieve their academic goals.
- 96% of respondents are likely or highly likely to recommend UNA Health Services to another individual.
- Additional respondent comments:
 - "I love how streamlined the process is now. The NP was very kind and thorough, as well."
 - "The staff are always friendly, knowledgeable, and easy to communicate with regarding any issue."
 - "Flu shot offering in the GUC was extremely convenient. Jean Ann was very professional, courteous, and welcoming."
 - "Going and booking an appointment was super easy, and everyone who I came into contact with was helpful and friendly and wanted to help me feel better. This was probably the smoothest I.V. experience I've ever had."



MILITARY & VETERAN SERVICE CENTER

As of January 3, 2023, the Veterans Affairs School Certifying Officer role transitioned from the Military & Veteran Service Center office to the Office of the Registrar. This transition allows all of the departments that directly support enrollment, financial aid, and student accounts to be under the same portfolio. An added benefit is that veterans and their dependents may now access early course registration. The Division of Student Affairs continues to support the Military & Veteran Service Center programmatically as well as in working with the Student Veterans of America registered student organization.





- In Spring 2023, 276 students were Military Connected Veterans/Dependents receiving Federal Veterans Affairs, State National Guard, and Department of Defense (DOD) education-related benefits. This number included all chapters as well as Alabama National Guard Educational Assistance Program (ANGEAP) and Tuition Assistance Only.
- \$1.38 million in tuition and fees were paid to UNA, of which \$524,000 came directly from the Department of Veterans Affairs.
- 65 Veterans as Military Heroes Scholarship Recipients were certified in Fall 2022 and 43 in Spring 2023.















UNIVERSITY CASE MANAGEMENT

- Referrals to University Case Management saw an increase of 45%, from 416 in 2021–2022 to 602 in 2022–2023.
- The largest growth was seen in referrals of academic, financial, and social adjustment concerns.
- 184 referrals were made to additional on-campus support service, with the largest number going to Disability Support Services (51) and an additional 18 to off-campus services (numbers for Fall 2022 and Spring 2023 only).
- Caring for the Pride Emergency Financial Assistance requests continued to increase with a total of \$20,306.32 distributed (from Spring 2022 to Spring 2023).
- 750 Meal Swipes were distributed to students through Feeding the Pride.

- Senior Administrative Assistant attended MaxFest to increase proficiency in Maxient and support her professional development.
- Participating in a consulting process with Grand Rivers Solutions to enhance Title IX services to students while refining internal procedures.
